Summertime, and the living is easy! The fish are jumping, and the cotton is high...

Well, it feels like the summers in Arkansas I remember from being a little kid, these 103° days – of course it's worrisome, being so dry that it looks like mid-August, the grass so sere and lifeless-looking...

But right now I'm not going to worry about it.

I'm thinking about food.

The thing that is especially luscious about summer is the abundance of barbeques, cookouts, picnics: all times for us to get together with friends and family and eat together.

In this heat, it has been more tempting to make cold food like salad, or deviled eggs, or gazpacho, that cold soup with fresh tomatoes and cucumbers and green peppers and onions, all chopped up, and a dash of Tabasco and some V-8 and some ice cubes. And salt and pepper. Yum!

Summer is also the time for fresh fruit – those peaches that melt in your mouth and drip down your chin until you figure out how to slurp it into your mouth as you bite.

The act of eating, so sensual, so significant, so solitary! Our tasting and savoring and experiencing these delights of summer is private, in some essential way. And yet, so often we choose to eat together, if we have the choice.

So I was thinking about the importance of that shared food, and what it does for us, just to break bread, just to pass the coleslaw along, just to pour a lemonade for someone and hand it over.

There's something sacred about sharing food. Food represents, like water, life itself – we must eat to live. So sharing food is a form of sharing life. Alone we really are nothing. We know that we need one another. Even our enjoyment is sweeter with someone to share it with.

To be able to speak to someone else of our delight, of our astonishment at beauty, of the sweetness and bitterness of life, gives it meaning far beyond our solitary experience.
